

MGH Center for Global Health Research Development Award

Purpose: The CGH Research Development Award is designed to support investigators who are beginning careers in global health research. The award is not restricted to any specific area within global health, but the research must be grounded in a robust, in-country partnership and contribute to the local research agenda.

Applicants: This award is open to post-doctoral fellows, instructors, and assistant professors at MGH. Successful applicants will be able to demonstrate how the funding will enable progression to the next stage of their career (e.g., future grant applications). A committed research mentor must be identified.

Funding: This award provides \$75,000 (direct costs) over two years and may be used to support salary, research expenses, and/or travel. CGH will support the indirect costs associated with the award.

Application process:

Interested applicants should submit the following materials:

- Research plan, including significance, innovation, and approach (max. 3 pages)
- Statement of how the study contributes to:
 - Researcher career development (max. ½ page)
 - Equity in global health research (max. ½ page)
- Budget and budget justification. Budget template is [here](#).
- NIH-format biosketch for the applicant and research mentor
- Letter of recommendation from the research mentor
- Letter from the applicant's department chair indicating the level of commitment to the applicant and global health within the department.

Application submission: Applications are due by **5 pm on January 26** and should be submitted as a single PDF to Lindsey Garrison at legarrison@mgh.harvard.edu with the subject line, "CGH Research Development Award."
