- Harvard Global Health Institute (HGHI) Burke Global Health Fellowship

 <u>APPLICATIONS DUE BY 5 PM ET ON MARCH 8</u>
 The HGHI Burke Global Health Fellowship is a 12-month program that provides funding for research and curriculum development. There are two categories of fellowship awards: a Research Award (\$75,000) and a Curriculum Development and Teaching Award (\$25,000). Recipients will also receive funding for professional development and up to \$5,000 towards attending a qualifying research conference or networking event. - MGH Global Health Community Engagement Awards These awards aim to improve health equity and support community-based projects, humanitarian opportunities and requests for specialized assistance from NGOs. Awards / Recognition

Dr. Alison Castle, MD, and Dr. Peter Olds, MD, selected to receive the CGH Research Development Award





Dr. Alison Castle, MD, was selected for the proposal *PrEPared for Change: Addressing PrEP Disparities in Young Men with High-Risk Alcohol Behaviors in South Africa.* The \$75,000 award will support Dr. Castle's aims of 1) Exploring the barriers and facilitators to PrEP utilization among young men with low- to moderate- and high-risk alcohol use behaviorist KwaZulu-Natal; and 2) using preference elicitation methods to understand the location, timing and delivery for a PrEP intervention among young men with alcohol use behaviors in KwaZulu-Natal.

Dr. Peter Olds, MD, was selected for the proposal Developing Better Control Together, a multi-faceted patient-support group for patients with hypertension in Uganda. The \$75,000 award will support Dr. Olds' aims to 1) develop a multi-faceted patient-support group intervention for hypertension patients in Uganda using the ADAPT-ITT framework; and 2) conduct a pilot study of Better Control Together for patients with hypertension in Uganda.

Ruma Rajbhandari, MD, MPH, receives the CGH Medical Education and Innovation Development Award

Ruma Rajbhandari, MD, MPH, is the recipient of the CGH Medical Education and Innovation Development Award for her proposal: Nick Simons Institute and MGH Global Health Bilateral Exchange Program. The Nick Simons Institute (NSI) is a Nepali-run non-governmental organization, and recipient of the WHO's 2023 Sasakawa Award, that has been working to innovate solutions to rural health, in part by addressing healthcare worker shortages through training and retention programs. This \$20,000 award will support her transformative initiative aimed at fostering bilateral exchange of medical professionals, administrators, and health management staff between Nepal and the Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH)



community to foster a truly collaborative exchange and further global health equity, knowledge transfer, and career opportunities for health professionals.

Global Health Community Highlights





Lena Dohlman, MD, MPH, returned earlier this month from the University of Global Health Equity (UGHE) in Butaro, Rwanda. She spent a week as an enthusiastic visiting faculty to help teach at the inaugural Anesthesia Bootcamp for 36 medical students. The course details were organized by Dr. Callum Forbes, who is a Paul Farmer global surgery research fellow with the Program in Global Surgery and Social Change. Dr. Forbes was fortunate to have recruited several anesthesiologists from within Rwanda to participate in the teaching. There

remains a critical shortage of physician anesthesiologist educators in Rwanda – well below the widely recommended minimum of 4-5 /100,000. The Anesthesia Bootcamp at UGHE was initiated as another piece to the puzzle of improving anesthesia safety and to help build capacity. The days were divided into didactics in the morning focused on safety basics in the operating room and ICU and skills stations and simulation in the afternoon. Dr. Dohlman looks forward to learning the outcome of their admittedly small contribution to building anesthesia capacity and safety in Rwanda.






Get on the Map
